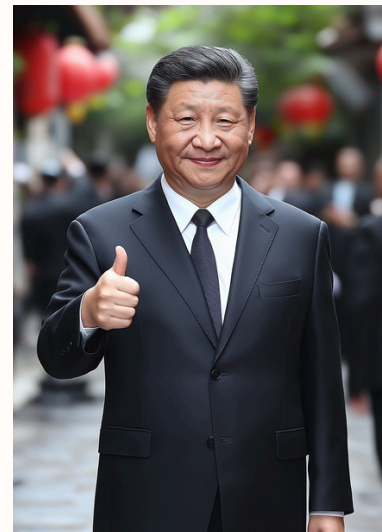

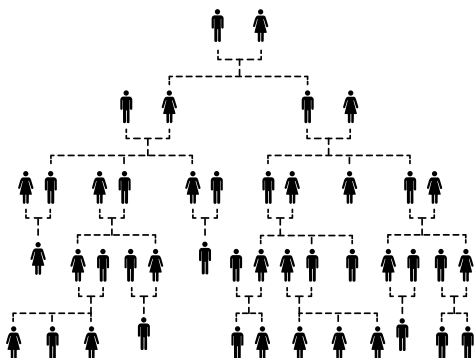

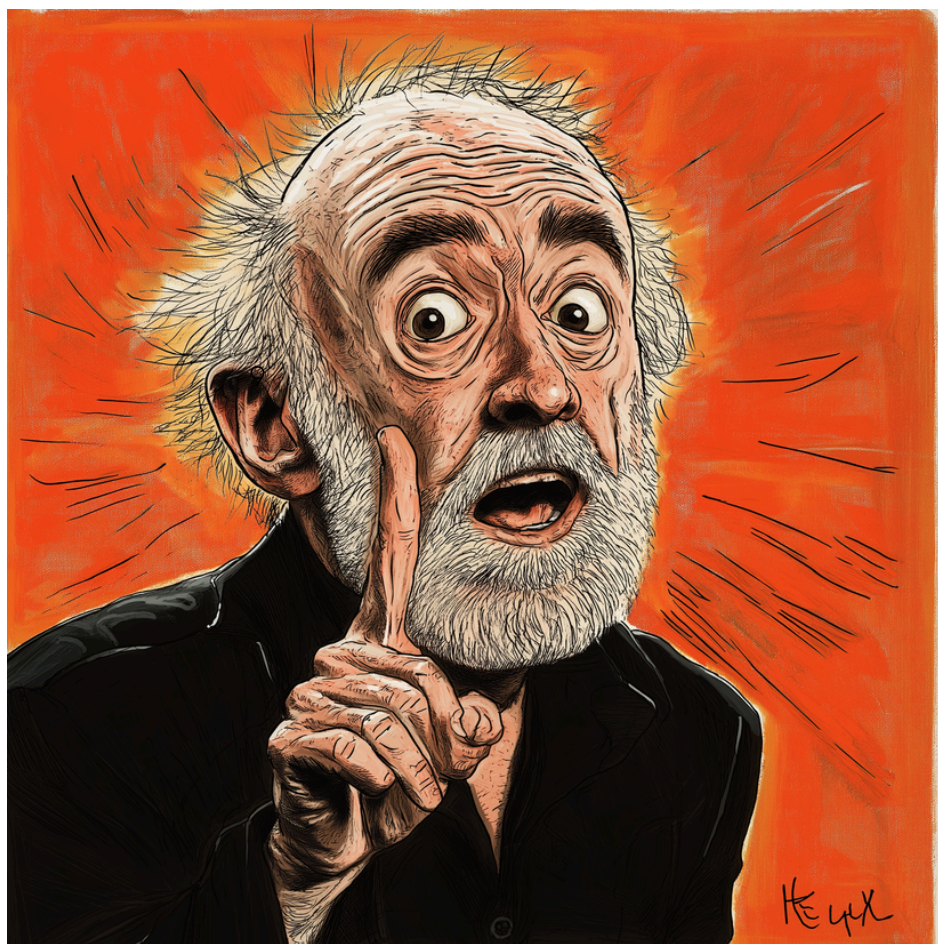
NEPOTISM CULT!
